## The Rev. Cameron Nations

This past year was one of contrasts. On the one hand, 2023 was a year of continued vitality and growth as we emerged into our new post-Covid reality; on the other hand, the weight of our debt finally caught up with us and required us to make some incredibly tough decisions about how to move forward.

At last year's Annual Meeting, I declared 2023 "The Year of the Strategic Plan." (More on that can be found further into my report.) What a year to be reminded that things don't always go according to plan-- no matter how strategic! We ended 2022 having had one of our best financial years ever. We had budgeted for a significant deficit in 2022, but, blessedly, had ended the year barely in the red at all. After enduring the worst and most challenging days of the pandemic, things felt like they had finally turned around. It was time to turn our focus to the future. Our forecasts looked promising and pledges to the Walk In Love Parish Hall Campaign looked to carry us through to 2024, giving us time to pray and discern about how we would approach our debt moving forward and balance it against other priorities and parish needs.

Yet things didn't pan out quite as we had hoped, and circumstances forced us to make some decisions regarding our debt service earlier than previously planned.

Though our operating revenue was fairly strong, commitments to the end of the Walk In Love campaign fell well below our estimates. Regular giving plateaued from the year before. Without the support of supplemental income sources (like PPP funds and diocesan Covid relief grants) that had sustained us through the leaner years of 2020 and 2021, we found ourselves having to draw down on cash reserves to meet our debt obligations. As we headed into the summer months, it became clear that we were not on a sustainable path. If our trajectory had continued, we would have literally run out of money in Q1 of 2024 and found ourselves in crisis. It certainly wasn't where I, nor our parish leadership, wanted us to be, but we hoped we could close the gap and avoid having to make significant changes to our staff or programs. In the end, however, we had to make the heartwrenching decision to say goodbye to two beloved staff members in order to get us on a path of financial sustainability.

But this tells only part of the story, and to end there would be to sell short many of the wondrous things that God has accomplished in our parish over the past year. While our finances certainly got a lot of airtime in 2023, they are merely one part of a much larger whole, and there is so much more to tell and to celebrate. As I repeated throughout the fall, two things can both be true at the same time: things can ultimately be headed in the right direction even amidst temporary setbacks. I believe that's where we find ourselves as we head into 2024. So let's talk about all of the good that we experienced this past year. There was a lot of it! (And this summary won't even scratch the surface.)

#### **Increased Engagement and Attendance**

First, we did see some pretty significant growth and engagement, especially in Sunday service attendance and various spiritual formation opportunities. Our overall average Sunday attendance increased by 18%, from 149 in 2022 to 176 in 2023. Our 8am Rite I saw a 31% in average attendance, from 26 in 2022 to 34 in 2023. Our 10:30am Rite II increased by 15.5%, going from 123 in 2022 to 142 in 2023. We had about 70 people each Wednesday evening during Lent join us for our Lenten Soup Supper series, *In the Wilderness: An Exploration of Where We Meet God and Where God Meets Us.* We have also seen increasing Sunday school attendance across the board, with an average of about 60 individuals (across all age groups) participating in spiritual formation throughout the fall of 2023, up significantly over the year before.

As you will read later in this report, our youth program in particular has thrived, with Spencer's work leading to lives transformed and the Gospel lived out in our community and beyond.

We also saw some big increases in attendance at our major holiday services. We saw greater participation in Holy Week liturgies, most notably at Good Friday (up a whopping 64.5% over 2022, from 76 to 125) and Easter Sunday (up 17% over 2022, from 389 to 454). Christmas, too, saw a big increase over the previous year. Christmas Eve and Christmas Day saw a 33% increase over 2022 (from 471 people in 2022 to 628 in 2023), and that is not counting the attendance at our Advent IV service Christmas Eve morning. There were 291 at our 4pm pageant service alone in 2023!

Some of these increases were driven by the hard work and innovation of our choirmaster, Sara Burden-McClure, who introduced some new services and worship opportunities (such as our Good Friday cantata service) into our usual rotation. These new worship opportunities clearly bore fruit! While growth is not the only indicator of vitality, nor is growth always synonymous with health (plenty of unhealthy churches can experience growth), I do believe growth to be an important indicator, and one that points to a work of the Spirit amongst us at St. Richard's.

#### **Parish Retreat**

Speaking of the Holy Spirit, in May we gathered for our first parish retreat in many years. The theme, One in the Spirit, had us focus on the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives, individually and corporately. We had over 60 join us for the weekend, and it too ended up bearing much fruit, going on to inspire our 2024 stewardship campaign, Many Members; One Body.



#### Visioning Workshop

In June, we hosted a visioning workshop facilitated by our Treasurer, David Todd. It was a Spirit-filled time of conversation, dreaming, and discerning about where God is leading our church. The information gathered at that workshop will play a vital part in shaping the various aspects of our strategic plan. (I did mention a strategic plan, remember? More on that in just a minute.)

#### **Pumpkin Patch**

God was also at work as some of our longest-running ministries brought on new leadership. Our Pumpkin Patch is a great example, with Chris and Alyssa Norton stepping up to coordinate this year and Colin Hardman helping manage our pumpkin unloads. Their participation alongside longtime Patch veterans like Ted West, Warren Gillespie, Robin Mueller, and Brent Saxon (and our Scout Troop!) helped to make this year's Patch a success, impacting our community in mighty ways. I highly encourage you to read the Patch report found later on in this document to read more about the Patch's impact and the community relationships it continues to foster.

#### St. Richard's School

Our school continues to grow and thrive, limited only by space constraints and the ability to recruit new teachers. The revitalization of the School Board over the past few years has been phenomenal, helping to drive new fundraising initiatives that are positioning St. Richard's School for a very promising future. As we remain mindful of our community's population growth, driven in no small part by a over-representation of young families in Round Rock, Hutto, and Georgetown, the School is clearly a vital asset to our parish as well as an opportunity for mission, outreach, and community engagement. For this reason, it will play a significant part in our strategic plan.

### Strategic Plan

Which, at last, brings me back to the strategic plan. Over the course of 2023, our staff, ministry leaders, and others have been in prayerful discernment about God's plan for our church. We've been gathering data, praying, and listening. In December, two Area Missioners for the Diocese of Texas, the Rev. Andrew Terry and Kelly McRae, came to St. Richard's to facilitate a strategic planning retreat for our vestry. At that retreat, we did important work that helped us distill all the data we had collected into something coherent and purposeful. It still needs a bit of fine-tuning, but what emerged is an exciting plan that will guide us over the next two years, getting us to 2026: our 50th anniversary. I look forward to sharing that plan with you in Q1 of 2024.

In the meantime, I want to say a huge **thank you** to our outgoing vestry members who played such a big part in shepherding us to this point: Pauline Hoehn, Dokie Walker, Brian Chase, and Jeff Krech. I truly cannot express how grateful I am for each of you and your leadership these past three years. We are all better for your service to the church.

Personally, this year was a rough one for me. In the span of just three months from May to July, I lost both of my grandmothers and one of my aunts. On top of that, one of our dogs, Sophie, was diagnosed with terminal cancer.

But through all of that, I felt surrounded by your prayers. You were understanding when I had to be gone to be with my family, and you sent cards and left kind messages that were a comfort in my grief. I can't tell you how much I appreciated your care and concern, and it too served as a reminder of what ultimately matters about our life together.

Ultimately, everything we do here at St. Richard's-- from our worship to our opportunities for formation, fellowship, and service-- is about two things: fostering communion with God, and fostering communion with one another. That's it.

The true measure of success for me as your rector is not reflected so much in the numbers (though those are encouraging), but in the stories behind them. Stories of lives transformed, of disciples made, of connections deepened, and of spirits renewed. I believe with all my being that the world needs the hope of the Gospel. The world needs the kind of community that the church, at its best, provides.

As mentioned above, this Annual Report (like all Annual Reports) tells a story. It's our story. It's God's story. And it's a privilege to be even a small part of it with you.

### Ministry Highlights in 2023:

The vestry welcomed new members for 2023: Kyle Thomas, Bobby Schmidt, Warren Gillespie, Jonathan Wickline and Stephen Mueller. The Junior Warden provided information about buildings and other related duties.

Working closely with the finance committee, the vestry approved the 2024 budget.

Vestry member Don Parker helped coordinate Safety Saturday, providing information on how to respond to emergencies on the church campus along with a CPR training and refresher. Several vestry members helped audit Emergency Response actions.

Vestry member Bobby Schmidt attended the School Board Meetings and updated the vestry on school activities. The vestry provided a basket for the annual school fundraiser.

The vestry decided on and publicized Pumpkin Patch recipients early in the year and made disbursements from Pumpkin Patch proceeds in a timely manner.

Brian Chase completed the website conversion, redesign, and update.

The vestry collaborated with David Todd on a Visioning workshop to help clarify issues for the Fall Strategic Planning Session.

Vestry members reached out and invited parishioners to the 8/20 kickoff of fall programming, and helped to update the parish database.

The Stewardship Committee, comprised of Warren Gillespie, Stephen Mueller and Dokie Walker, delivered monthly messaging about Stewardship all year, helping to increase pledges. The Vestry also participated in the Strategic planning workshop designed to developed a 5-year plan for St. Richard's growth.

**Goals for 2024:** To guide the parish to attain and maintain fiscal stability by increasing pledging units and determining ways to pay down the Parish Hall mortgage.

## EXCLUDING CLEANING ACCOUNT, WE FINISHED 2023 AT \$91 OVER BUDGET. (NOT A TYPO!)

- Cleaning account was \$2.5K over budget for the year (need to adjust budget for 2024).
- Data above includes the value of the December cleaning invoice that was not paid in December.
- The budget for 2024 and beyond will need to cover more outsourcing of lawn/landscaping care as our primary volunteers will be curtailing their efforts in 2024.
- The Gardening Team Restricted Funds account has a balance of about \$5.5K which will be used to outsource certain annual tasks that are not being covered by volunteers.

#### **KEY PROJECTS COMPLETED IN 2023:**

- Replaced the original issue sanctuary HVAC units; thanks to all that contributed to the HVAC replacement fund!
- Worked out issues with "spotty internet" and replaced broken WiFi access points (again).
- Replaced Admin Bldg HVAC Unit #5 (funded out of "special projects" account).
- Began program to replace tube fluorescent bulbs with more efficient LED tubes (thanks Rickey!)
- Created "Campus Facilities Overview" document and presented same to staff and vestry
- Finished/published the Emergency Management Procedures and Guidelines (thanks Don Parker!)

### **KEY PROJECTS COMPLETED IN 2023 (Cont'd):**

- Held first annual "Safety Saturday" for staff, school and interested parishioners.
- Posted Evacuation Assembly Area Signs/Maps and Severe Weather Assembly Area Signs.
- Conducted audits of several Emergency Response Team events.
- Negotiated new electricity purchase contract; discovered that prior provider had charged sales tax for the past 4 years so we made a claim to the State for a refund of over \$7K.
- Campus experienced a hail storm in September; our insurance provided about \$25K for needed repairs.
- Repaired 3 sidewalk trip hazards near building entries.
- Worked with School to complete their playground expansion project and to add a classroom space.
- Completed EDOT funded "Church Inspection and Repair Recommendation Program Audit;" awaiting analysis and report.
- Fixed all the other broken stuff! If it wasn't broken, we couldn't fix it!

#### **KEY PROJECTS FOR 2024**

- Install new HVAC unit serving hallway between School and Narthex and School restrooms.
- Pressure wash Sanctuary exterior, clean/polish Parish Hall floor.
- Transition to outsourced landscaping maintenance by year end.
- Finish updates to systems documentation for all building systems.
- Finish uploading all "Junior Warden Documentation" to new Parish database repository.
- Develop new five-year plan for the site.
- Onboard new Junior Warden.

## David Todd

2023 was indeed a challenging year. While revenues remain improved over pre-Covid numbers, our operating revenue remained virtually flat. Additionally, pledged parish hall debt fell 79% short of budget, and overall we collected only 72% of what was pledged for the 5-year capital campaign that ended in 2023. Going forward, paying the parish hall loans will come from general operating revenues to ensure we can meet our annual debt obligations. We are pleased to announce that some 23 generous families and souls have committed enough to cover the parish hall debt through 2024. This releases general operating funds for additional mission and ministry. We thank the 106 families and individuals who have pledged (at the submission of this report) \$447,588 for 2024 general operations. However, at the time of this report we remain short in pledging for 2024 by \$177,412 of the \$625,000 target to fully fund 2024 anticipated mission and ministry needs.

In 2023, we continued to manage our expenses well and had to make the decision to adjust staffing levels. Overall, we experienced a \$67,000 shortfall versus a planned \$25,000 budget surplus.

While continuing to face same challenges we all have faced (inflation and other difficulties), revenue shows a diminished picture from 2022 but improved from Covid year levels. Capital campaign giving continued to lag the amounts needed to pay off the debt at the end of the Walk in Love Capital Campaign in 2023. We can continue to make the minimum loan payments, but this will result the payoff being at the full 20-year term of the loans and mean increased interest expenses over an early payoff.

And while we did experience challenges and had to make tough decisions in 2023, there is much to celebrate about the year as well: 1.) St. Richard's continued to maintain our inperson and digital mission, ministry and programs, which all experienced double-digit growth and help us as life continues. 2.) We still have an amazing staff, along with our Vestry and ministry leaders who are vital to managing our resources and finding new ways for our parish family to connect. 3.) St. Richard's has set up permanent endowments for general operations and a specific endowment to send youth on scholarship to Camp Allen.

We want to celebrate everyone who faithfully supported St. Richard's in 2023 and into 2024. Each of you is so vital to our mission and ministry. Thank you!





Note 2 - Revenues & Expenses







Parish Hall Loan Status (Dec 2023)








Our preschool and Kindergarten is a fully-accredited, part-time program that serves children ages 2 years through kindergarten. We nurture our children's spiritual, intellectual, physical, social, and emotional growth. We promote Christ-centered values in all areas of our curriculum.



#### **Playground Expansion**

This year has been very exciting for our school. With our Texas workforce grant monies we were able to add to our playground by building a covered turfed area for gross motor games. We also increased our picnic area and put a cover over it to enjoy snack time, lunch and outside events. This year at our meet the teacher event we had a ribbon cutting to officially open the new playground area. We also dedicated a picnic table in memory of Wayne Sanderson whose family has been a wonderful support of the church and preschool.

### **Fundraising and Events**

Fundraising continues to be important to our program. This year we held two fundraising events. In May we hosted the second annual fundraiser dinner and auction – this was a great event where church and school came together to raise money. In October we held our annual raffle where each classroom created an amazing, themed basket.

As a tuition funded school these two events made a huge difference in our budget. This year we have raised **\$21,000**. Because we rely solely on tuition to fund our operations, we are constantly trying to balance teacher wages with tuition costs. Our goal is to provide each student with the best education possible and give our teachers the compensation they deserve. As we grow in our fundraising efforts, we will be able to accomplish this goal.

We held our 2nd annual Christmas event where school and church can come together and make Christmas cards, decorate cookies, see Santa and get to know each other better. In the next couple of years, we hope to grow this event and open it up to the community.

# CHILDREN'S MINISTRY (3-12 YRS)

## The Rev. Cameron Nations

Our children's ministry seeks to provide spiritual instruction and nourishment for those in our parish aged 3-12 years to help them grow in their knowledge and love of the Lord. We have two main areas of focus: Sunday morning formation and our summertime Vacation Bible School (VBS).

#### **Sunday Morning Formation**

We have three classes or "Levels":

Level 1 (3-6 years) Level 2 (6-9 years) Level 3 (9-12 years)

We began 2023 by offering a curriculum called Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, which we had used since before the pandemic. Catechesis is a Montessori-based approach to childhood Christian education that comes out of the Roman Catholic Church. But over the summer Mother Kelly began to re-envision part of our children's formation program, and we entered the fall with a new game plan that included a Bible- and discussion-based offering for our Level 3 kids.

After Mother Kelly's departure in October, we continued to adapt our program to our current needs. **Level 1** is still heavily Catechesis-inspired. **Level 2** is a Bible story-driven class that incorporates elements of Godly Play (itself inspired initially by Catechesis.) **Level 3** follows various studies and curricula that are aimed at helping teach children how to engage with scripture and other elements of their faith as they prepare to enter youth group. All three levels are intended to help nurture curiosity and spiritual growth in a loving, fun, and joyful environment.

Our volunteers and leaders have carried us through the year. A special thanks to Diane DuTeil, Nancy Krech, Becky Parker, Wendy Stocker, and Nadine Genece for helping to keep things running in the midst of a period of transition. Diane in particular has been a huge help as a temporary children's ministry coordinator as we transition into this next chapter of our children's ministry at St. Richard's.

We continue to see more children involved in Sunday morning formation, and would love to see still more in 2024!

#### **VBS**

Our VBS in June was a huge success. We welcomed over 70 kids who spent the week learning about the story of Moses.

The week could not have happened without the work of dozens of adult and youth volunteers who gave of their time and talents to bring everything to life!

#### **Continued Need**

We are always in need of greater participation to enable our children's ministry to thrive. Though we did see increased participation in the fall of 2023, we pray that this trend would continue and increase in the year ahead.

We need more leaders and volunteers who can rotate through each classroom on Sundays to provide coverage and support. Many hands truly do make light work.

We also encourage more families to bring their children regularly to Sunday school. Your presence is the most powerful tool we have for the transformation of our children's ministry. It really does make a difference!

#### The Future

Children's ministry is a high priority for us, and is one of our core focus areas in our strategic plan. Our future vision for children's ministry is guided by these 4 principles:

- 1. Children's ministry should nurture curiosity and wonder while also remaining joyful, hopeful, and fun.
- 2. We want our kids to know that God loves them unconditionally.
- 3. We want our kids to come away each week with some new insight or knowledge of and appreciation for their faith and tradition.
- 4. Understanding that parents, relatives, and mentors are the true "chief formation officers" in our kids lives, we want equip, encourage, and support parents in the discipleship of their children.

Saint Richard's Youth Ministry works to build up middle-, junior-, and high school students. We help prepare them to navigate the chances and challenges of life, reminding them that God loves them through all stages of faith and life. We dive deeper into the Bible and often discuss how it applies our lives. #### Goal(s) for 2024:

We're renting rooms at the Diocese Retreat Center near San Juan and working on a plan meet, worship, serve and explore together with their youth.

The estimated cost per person before fundraising is \$1600, including airfare, meals, van rentals, and fun outings. Saint Richard's wants to make this Mission Trip accessible and affordable to everyone that wants to attend. So we hope you will partner with us to send our youth on this life changing trip.

## By the Numbers

We are in communication with **90 youth and parents each week**, including **51** parents and **39** youth.

This includeds fielding questions, prayer requests, check-in's and follow ups, and in-person attendance at Youth Group, Sunday School and special events.

#### Youth Group:

23 students attending at least twice a month with an average of 15 weekly.

#### **Sunday School:**

18 students attending at least once a month with an average of 10 weekly.

#### **Additional Notes:**

- Youth have brought friends that are not members of our church, averaging about 2 a month.
- Sunday School has a big fluctuation in attendance week to week, while Youth Group has been more consistent.
- We have 99 followers on Instagram and 76 followers on Facebook.

This year, St. Richard's celebrated the 25th year of our annual pumpkin patch! The patch is the single largest community-facing event that we do each year, and it helps generate thousands of dollars for our outreach partners as we seek to impact our community each year. Beyond the money that it raises, our patch also facilitates deeper relationships both within our parish and across our community.



The patch is a big undertaking. It requires hundreds of volunteers (and just as many volunteer hours!) to pull off. We want to begin by thanking **everyone** who came together to make this year's patch a success

The following report highlights what we all accomplished through this year's patch and includes some of our goals for next year.

#### Overview

Despite increased competition from the City of Round Rock (who has started their own month-long event at Old Settlers Park), and despite our tent being destroyed by an early October hailstorm, we managed to increase our revenue over the previous year, from \$92,411 in 2022 to \$95,827 in 2023. After expenses, this meant that we were able to distribute almost \$33,000 in community outreach funds!

This year, we had greater school participation, a higher number of new volunteers, welcomed more vendors to the tent, and also invested in some social media marketing.

On the following pages, you can see a specific breakdown of our patch finances, as well as detailed metrics from our digital advertising efforts.

#### **Future Goals**

Next year, we hope to increase revenue through more advertising and greater partnership with our community organizations, increase volunteer participation, and have more acivities for visitors-- especially kids and families-- to enjoy.





### **Ministry Description:**

Troop 154 was established over 35 years ago and has grown into a very successful and close-knit group of families. The Scouting experience is divided into five programs according to age and activities. These five programs include Cub Scouts (K-5th Grade), Scouts BSA (Ages 10-17), Venturing (Ages 14-20), Sea Scouts (Ages 14-20) and Exploring (Ages 10-20). Currently, we only charter/offer the Scouts BSA/Boy Scout program at St. Richards.

Our troop is a Scout-led troop that utilizes the BSA patrol method to teach our Scouts leadership, character development, citizenship, reverence (Duty to God), physical fitness, and outdoor skills. As per our 2023 recharter, we had 17 active youth and 10 adult leaders that comprised Troop 154.

#### **Ministry Highlights in 2023:**

2023 was an active year for Troop 154. The Scouts participated in various outdoor activities that included community service, fishing, hikes/orienteering, merit badge fairs and semi-monthly campouts.

Thanks to generous donations and fundraising events, we were able to attend summer camp away from the Texas heat this July, as we escaped to the mountains of New Mexico.

While on campus, the Scouts assisted the St. Richards Day School with a handful of projects and took the lead on activities related to the Pumpkin Patch Set up and teardown, along with assisting in pumpkin unloads.

We also hailed a new milestone in 2023 as we celebrated a new Eagle Scout! This represents our 1st Eagle since the reactivation in 2019 and is the Troop's 26th Eagle in its 35+ year history.

## ROUND ROCK AREA SERVING CENTER

### Kate Monteiro

The Round Rock Area Serving Center (RRASC), started by local churches to meet the needs of the less fortunate in our community, is the non-profit social service and food pantry for Round Rock and northern Williamson County. Services at the Serving Center are primarily provided by volunteers as the Serving Center has only five paid staff members.

This has been a record-breaking year of need for RRASC. They now support over 1,100 families each month with varying services and over 1.5 million pounds of food runs through their food bank annually to members of our community. This has been a strong year for the St. Richard's relationship with RRASC. This year, our parish donated **39 hours** of volunteer time at RRASC, the majority of which took place during our four quarterly parish workdays.

We also were very engaged in RRASC's largest annual fundraiser, Karamu, in which we donated two baskets to their silent auction, purchased many tickets to the event, and many parish members who attended the event made further in-person donations, part of which was directed toward RRASC's Legacy of Compassion Capital Campaign.

**The Legacy of Compassion Capital Campaign** to build an additional building on the property next door to the Round Rock Area Serving Center is going very well. The total campaign goal is \$7,000,000 and as of January 1st they have raised \$6,162,180.

They must raise \$674,428 by April 11, 2024 to receive the Mabee Foundation Challenge Matching Grant of \$1.3 million. Thank you to all who have pledged or made a one-time donations! There is still time if you haven't yet contributed or would like to make an additional contribution to this community wide effort to give. #### **Ministry Description:**

Kairos is a lay lead interdenominational prison ministry following the Cursillo model of a 3 day retreat inside stable population prisons. Following the 3 days weekends, Kairos volunteers participate in the weekly prayer and share meetings and monthly reunions that hold Kairos graduates accountable to themselves and their peers for their walk with Christ. Kairos Prison Ministry International is active in 37 states and 9 foreign countries.

#### **Ministry Highlights in 2023:**

During the year, St. Richard's has supported the Men's Kairos program at the Alfred D. Hughes TDCJ Unit in Gatesville and the Women's Kairos program at the Coleman TDCJ Unit in Lockhart.

It takes about \$20,000 to put on a Kairos Weekend and a ton of cookies. The St. Richard's community has been very generous in their support of this program with prayer, baking cookies, and financial support. Kairos would not happen without you.

## MUSIC MINISTRY

## Sara Burden-McClure

In 2023, we continued the rebuilding effort begun in the spring of 2022, and engaged in opportunities to learn and share some new experiences in music and the arts!

Heartfelt thanks must be expressed to the members of the choir, who rehearse weekly to support congregational singing and present anthems for our 10:30 Sunday service and other special services! Their ministry and commitment have been truly integral to our worship. While there has been turnover this year as some members moved from the area or suffered health issues, we have been delighted to have new members join us, and our choir is averaging about 18 singers for festival services and 11 singers for regular Sundays. This has allowed us to undertake some exciting new repertoire throughout the year (including the Holy Week cantata presented on Good Friday evening, and some special concert selections for Senior Access's Mistletoe Magic community choir concert in December) and to lay the foundation for a few breakout ensembles in 2024. Including the Good Friday cantata, the choir sang 42 new anthems, plus introduced 10 new-to-us hymns, Anglican chant settings of two psalms, and new-to-us settings of the Gloria, Sanctus and Agnus Dei (one each). Ten choir anthems learned in 2022 were repeated in 2023.

Likewise, we are quite grateful for the commitment of our bell choir's four members, and very much appreciate the assistance of a few substitute ringers, whose participation not only covers the occasional illness or absence of regulars, but also allows us to present some more complex musical selections. The bell players are eager to grow the ensemble to 8 regulars so that they can play more frequently in services and learn some three-octave selections. Despite much turnover, the bell choir was active and involved in services throughout the year. They learned and presented 6 new pieces, recycled 3 from the previous year, and learned and played four pieces in conjunction with choir and congregational singing.

In January of 2023, I made a personal commission of Austin composer P. Kellach Waddle to write a collection of organ works based on hymns for the season of Epiphany; each selection was tied to a hymn of the day and played as either a prelude or postlude, and I wrote articles about each hymn and related work that were included in the Order of Service. The composer himself presented a talk on the last Sunday of Epiphany about his musings and process in composing the collection, giving us a unique perspective. This has led to another commission of the same composer, this time by the church, to produce a Sanctus and an Agnus Dei for us to use as our own service music.

We were able to include more guest instrumentalists in 2023's services – we again enjoyed the Austin Brassworks quintet at Easter and were wowed by saxophonist Paul Baker in August – plus we've had wonderful in-house contributions by Lesley Grandstaff on flute, Duke DuTeil and Fr. Cameron on guitar, and pianists Emma Carlson, Sharon Tankersley and Brian Chase.

St. Richard's children and youth had fun presenting a new version of the Christmas pageant in December. This one used the same readings as in the last few years, but allowed characters to tell the story as well. Our actors ranged in age from 5 weeks to 18 years, and we were thrilled to have lots of angels, shepherds and animals join in on Christmas Eve! (Many thanks to our wonderful support team and audio tech!)

A Musical Feast Concert Series continues to provide excellent listening and outreach opportunities on the second Sunday of each month – although we did veer off schedule a few times to accommodate such high holy days as the Superbowl and Easter Sunday! We heard Austin Brassworks (twice!), Nacho Average Jazz Band's big band sound, and eclectic programs featuring classical guitar, oboe, instrumental trios, vocal duets and solos, pianists and black composers. Promotions go out to churches and organizations in Round Rock, Pflugerville and Austin, to music teachers in three school districts, and to various media arts calendars – and we are gradually seeing our reach grow. The programs are free, with an opportunity to donate to the artists if you are able. Please be sure to come enjoy these concerts, and bring a friend for a fun and easy introduction to our church community!

2023's projects did much to strengthen the foundation of our music and arts ministry, and great plans are afoot for 2024 – including a children's choir! Whether your thing is music, art, drama, or even logistics, we welcome your participation in this growing ministry!
